A Message from the Emergency Management Coordinator

Wildfire season is quickly approaching. As part of your spring cleaning, consider wild fire preparedness. Creating a defensible space free of combustible materials such as mulch, plant life, and other debris can go a long way in protecting your property in the event of a wild fire. Consider replacing mulch with decorative stone, trim back grasses and shrubs away from the home. Blow leaves and other debris out of flower beds and gardens. Don't forget first responders cannot help if they can't find you. Be sure to label driveways and mailboxes with reflective letters, and trim low hanging branches to ensure fire apparatus will fit down your driveway.

Here are some other helpful emergency preparedness tips:

- Make a plan: Create a family communications plan and a household plan that includes everyone in your home. Check out Readypa.org for helpful tips.
- **Prepare a kit:** Put together an emergency kit with supplies you might already have, like rugged outdoor gear.
- Stay informed: Learn about local emergency plans, emergency alerts, and local emergency contacts. Follow Washington Township Emergency Management and Lehigh County Emergency Management on FACEBOOK.
- Stay calm: Stay calm and focused during an emergency, and follow directions from public safety officials.
- Check for damage: Check your home for damage, including the roof, chimneys, and foundation. Report any damage to the EMA coordinator.
- Evacuate if ordered: If you are ordered to evacuate, do so.
- Have a Go Bag: Prepare a Go Bag that you can easily access in case of an unplanned evacuation. Be sure to pack Clothing, food, water, medications and important paperwork for every member of your family. Don't forget the furry members too.
- Consider financial preparedness: Financial preparedness is an important part of disaster planning. Keep a small amount of cash on hand. Remember credit card machines won't work in a power outage. Joe Mead

Alongside our classrooms, gift shop, and research library, the Osprey House includes such amenities as public restrooms, drinking water, trail maps, and information about our local history and ecology. Township Clean-up

Township clean up will be held on June 7th, 2025, 8:00 AM-12:00 PM. Items that will be accepted are old furniture and trash. Items that will be recycled are white goods, metals, electronics, and tires. We also accept old batteries, which are used to offset the purchase of batteries for Township equipment. Tires are now \$2.00 each. Large truck or tractor tires are now \$10.00. Tires should not have rims. No commercial or race tires. There will be a \$15.00 charge for removal of freon. Electronics will be accepted with fees.

TV prices are \$40.00 for under 42". TV's (in wooden cabinet, Projection, Over 42", TV Tubes (broken TV's) is \$60.00. No construction material will be allowed, this would include insulation, plaster board, etc. This will be the only clean up for the year and it is not known, at this time, if there will be other fees involved with collection. There will be a charge of \$25.00 for every mattress accepted. Starting in April the Township will be open to drop off yard waste on Saturdays between the hours of 8am-12pm.

Fall Leaf pick up:

Soon after the leaves start falling, the township will start our leaf pick up. Please remember to place your leaf piles as close to the road or curb as possible. Also be sure that leaf pile only contain leaves, vacuuming up rocks, branches or debris can be harmful to our staff and equipment. The township cannot safely pick up leaves on the following state roads: PA 873, Mountain Road or Old Post Road. Before putting leaves along any state road, please call the township to see if pick up will be possible. If you prefer to drop off your leaves or brush, this can be done at the township yard on Center Street between the hours of 7:30am and 3:30pm, Monday – Friday. Please be aware that brush burning is prohibited and leaf burning is only permitted during the month of November. Leaf burning in the VC zoning district is prohibited all year. Please check our web site for a copy of the complete burn ordinance and our yard hours.

The Mission of the Slatington Public Library is to improve and enrich the lives of the residents in our community through information, recreation, and education, using both traditional methods and emerging technologies.



Healthy Household Habits for Clean Water

Vehicle and Garage

Use a commercial car wish or wash your car on a lawn or other unpoved surface to minimize
the amount of darry, soapy water flowing into the storm drain and eventually time your local
waterbody.



- Check your car, boar, monorcycle, and other machinery and equipment for leaks and spills. Make repairs as soon as possible. Clean up spilled fluids with an absorbent material like kirsy litter or sand, and alon't rinse the spills into a nearby storm drain. Remember to properly dispose of the absorbent material.
 - Recycle used oil and other automotive fluids at participating service stations. Don't damp these chemicals down the storm drain or dispose of them in your trash.

Lawn and Garden

- Use pesticides and terrificers sparingly. When use is necessary, use these chemicals in the recommended amounts. Avoid application if the forecast calls for rain; otherwise, chemicals will be washed into your local stream.
- Select native plants and grasses that are drought- and pestteststant. Native plants require less water, fertilizer, and pesticides.
- Sweep up yard debris, rather than hosing down areas. Compost or recycle yard waste when possible.
- Don't overwater your lawn. Water during the cool times of the day, and don't let water run off into the storm drain.
- Cover piles of dirt and mulch being used in landscaping projects to prevent these pollutarisfrom blowing or washing off your yard and into local waterbodies. Vegetate bure spots in your yard to prevent soil ercotor.

Pet Care

When walking your per, remember to pick up the waste and dispose of it properly. Flushing per
waste is the best disposal method. Leaving per waste on the ground increases public health risks
by allowing harmful bacteria and nurrients to wash into the storm drain and eventually into loca
waterbodies.

Swimming Pool and Spa

- . Drain your swimming pool only when a test kit does not detect chlorine levels.
- Whenever possible, drain your pool or spa into the sanitary sewer system.
- Properly store pool and spa chemicals to prevent leaks and spills, preferably in a cowered area to avoid exposure to stormwater

Septic System Use and Maintenance

- Have your septic system inspected by a professional at least every 3 years, and have the septic tank pumped as necessary (usually every 3 to 5 years).
- Cure for the septic system drainfield by not driving or parking vehicles on it. Plant only grass
 over and near the drainfield to avoid damage from roots.
- Flush responsibly. Husbing household chemicals like paint, pesticides, oil, and antifreeze can
 destroy the biological treatment taking place in the system. Other items, such as dispers, paper
 towels, and can litter, can clog the septic system and potentially damage components.

Storm drains connect to waterbodies!

Property & Per Capita Taxes

NOTE: Mortgage companies pay township, county, & school taxes – township taxes are paid by your mortgage companies so do not pay them or duplicate payments are made. Most mortgage companies receive your tax amounts electronically without receiving the tax bill from you, but it is recommended for you to check with them. Per Capita taxes are not paid by your mortgage company – you are responsible to pay them.

- Township Real Estate is Issued April 1
- School Real Estate is Issued July 1
- Township and School Per Capitas are on the same bill and are issued together July 1

Each year, NOVA raises over \$400,000 to support its operations.

Our highly trained paramedics and EMTs respond to more than 3,600 calls annually from three stations located at 2375 Levans Rd, Coplay, 524 W. Church St., Slatington, and 6272 PA Route 309, New Tripoli, dispatching the closest available unit.

In addition to emergency responses, NOVA provides standby services for sporting events at Northwestern Lehigh and Northern Lehigh School districts, including football games, as well as for churches, bike races, marathons, and various community events requiring ambulance presence.

NOVA is in the final stages of updating our ambulance fleet. We received two ambulances in 2024 and expect the delivery of

two more in the first quarter of 2025. Furthermore, we will be replacing stair chairs and mechanical chest compression devices this year.

In an emergency, can the ambulance quickly find your residence, access your driveway, and get to your house? The extra minutes emergency response teams spend searching for your address or trying to navigate your driveway can make a real difference for a loved one in need. Ordinance #63 requires all property owners to post their address on their mailbox or building face. Make sure your driveway is maintained and is clear of obstructions such as low branches so that the emergency equipment can get to your house. For feral cats in Washington Township, The Sanctuary will loan traps to residents to assist in trapping feral/wild cats. Trapping will be done by citizens and trapping volunteers in the community.

Emergency Preparedness: POWER OUTAGES

Power outages can occur during any season and have different effects so it is helpful to be prepared at all times.

Before a power outage occurs:

- Make sure you have an emergency kit created. You can find what you should put in it at ready.pa.gov
- Always have cellular devices charged
- Have enough water in the home for 4 days along with food (that may not require electricity to heat)
- If you have a generator, always maintain enough fuel and test the generator monthly
- Keep your car's fuel level up
- If you have electric medical equipment, ensure you have a battery or manual way of handling the equipment.
- Have a working battery-operated radio so you can receive updates for shelters and evacuations if necessary

During the power outage:

- Utilize flashlights rather than candles due to the risk of fire
- Keep refrigerators/freezers closed so the temperature can

remain consistent


- Dress in layers according to time of year
- Disconnect appliances so that there no surges when power does return
- If using a generator, remember to not have the generator inside and away from your home so fumes do not enter your home

Once power returns:

- Throw away any food that may have dropped below approved temperatures
- Slowly turn electrical devices back on
- If you have natural gas and need someone turn it back on, have someone approved come out
- Restock any supplies you may have used out of your emergency kit or go bags.
